The following motions were duly made, seconded and approved:

RESOLVED to approve the December 13, 2011, Working Group Meeting Minutes;

RESOLVED to adopt language for three technical changes that provide greater clarity, remove out-dated references, and eliminate duplicative language;

RESOLVED to adopt draft language clarifying that combination lump-sum/monthly relief associations have authority to pay survivor benefits following the death of a monthly retiree who was collecting monthly benefits; and

RESOLVED to adopt draft language clarifying the status of volunteer firefighters who become employed as full-time firefighters.

I. Call to Order

Chair Auditor Otto called the meeting to order.

II. Review and Approval of Working Group Meeting Minutes

The members reviewed the December 13, 2011, meeting minutes that had been provided in advance. Ganfield made a motion to adopt the meeting minutes. Jaeger seconded the motion that was adopted unanimously.

III. Final Review of Approved Language for Technical Changes

The Working Group members reviewed language for three technical changes that had been approved during the last meeting. The technical changes would clarify that the tests to determine whether a relief association is eligible to invest using the expanded list of authorized investment securities are based just on Special Fund assets, remove out-dated references to the Minneapolis Teachers Retirement Fund Association and the Minneapolis Employees Retirement Fund, and remove duplicative language regarding an exemption for full-time firefighters. Simon made a motion to adopt the language for the three technical changes. Ganfield seconded the motion, which was adopted unanimously.

IV. Review of New Technical Change

Auditor Otto presented language for a new technical change for the Group's review. The change is being recommended to clarify that combination lump-sum/monthly relief associations have authority to pay survivor benefits following the death of a monthly retiree who was collecting monthly benefits. Currently, if a relief association's bylaws provide for a lump-sum service pension, the association is prohibited from paying ancillary benefits to any former member or on behalf of any former member after the former member terminates active service and commences receipt of a service pension. Because the bylaws of a combination relief association provide for a lump-sum service pension, this change is needed to clarify that survivors of a monthly retiree can collect a survivor benefit. Relief associations would continue to be prohibited from paying ancillary benefits if a lump-sum service pension had already been paid. Ganfield made a motion to adopt the draft language, with an effective date of the day following final enactment. Jaeger seconded the motion, which was adopted unanimously.

V. Review of Draft Deferred Service Pension Changes

Three issues were discussed regarding deferred service pensions. The first issue was a clarification issue. Current law appears to limit entitlement to a deferred service pension to members who separate from active service before reaching age 50. Zikmund made a motion to adopt the draft language to clarify that members who separate from active service and membership, and are vested, are entitled to a deferred service pension. The effective date would be January 1, 2013. King seconded the motion, which was adopted unanimously. Ganfield abstained.

The second deferred service pension issue is in regard to how interest or additional investment performance is calculated and credited to deferred member accounts.

Members and others in attendance expressed concern with language stating interest would be payable until the date of payment or the date on which the deferred service pension is transferred. Administratively, questions could arise if it takes time to process a deferred service pension transfer. There also was concern that many defined contribution plans only value member accounts at the end of each calendar year, making it difficult to implement daily valuing of deferred interest. Finally, the members discussed a recently published Federal court case addressing age discrimination and pension benefits. It was agreed that this topic would be held over for further discussion.

The third deferred service pension issue pertained to volunteer firefighters who become employed as full-time firefighters. In these situations, the firefighter can retire as a volunteer firefighter and, subject to certain requirements, be paid a volunteer service pension after reaching age 50. Anderson made a motion to adopt the draft language that clarifies these firefighters would be deferred members of the relief association until reaching age 50 and submitting an application for the deferred volunteer service pension. King seconded the motion. The members agreed the change would be effective on the date following final enactment, and agreed that “subsequent” should be replaced with a different term. Otto said that the wording would be fixed and assured the Working Group that the final draft would be brought before the Group at the February meeting.

VI. Discussion of IRS Tax-Exempt Issues

The discussion was held over to the February Working Group meeting.

VII Other Business

The Working Group members agreed to hold a final meeting in February to finish work on the deferred service pension topics.

Clarification for Full-Time Firefighters

424A.016 DEFINED CONTRIBUTION VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS' RELIEF ASSOCIATION SPECIFIC REGULATION.

Subd. 6. Deferred service pensions.

(a) A member of a relief association is entitled to a deferred service pension if the member:

(1) has completed the lesser of the minimum period of active service with the fire department specified in the bylaws or 20 years of active service with the fire department;

(2) has completed at least five years of active membership in the relief association; and

(3) separates from active service and membership before reaching age 50 or the minimum age for retirement and commencement of a service pension specified in the bylaws governing the relief association if that age is greater than age 50.

(b) The requirement under paragraph (a) that a member separate from active service and membership is waived for persons who have discontinued their volunteer firefighter duties and who are employed on a full-time basis under section 424A.015, subdivision 1.

424A.02 DEFINED BENEFIT RELIEF ASSOCIATIONS; SERVICE PENSIONS.

Subd. 7. Deferred service pensions.

(a) A member of a defined benefit relief association is entitled to a deferred service pension if the member:

(1) has completed the lesser of either the minimum period of active service with the fire department specified in the bylaws or 20 years of active service with the fire department;

(2) has completed at least five years of active membership in the relief association; and

(3) separates from active service and membership before reaching age 50 or the minimum age for retirement and commencement of a service pension specified in the bylaws governing the relief association if that age is greater than age 50.

(b) The requirement under paragraph (a) that a member separate from active service and membership is waived for persons who have discontinued their volunteer firefighter duties and who are employed on a full-time basis under section 424A.015, subdivision 1.

Exhibit C

Deferred Service Pension Changes

Defined Contribution Plans

424A.016 DEFINED CONTRIBUTION VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS' RELIEF ASSOCIATION SPECIFIC REGULATION.

Subd. 6. Deferred service pensions...

(c) A defined contribution relief association may, if its governing bylaws so provide, credit interest or additional investment performance on the deferred lump-sum service pension during the period of deferral. If provided for in the bylaws, the interest must be paid:

(1) at the investment performance rate actually earned on that portion of the assets if the deferred benefit amount is invested by the relief association in a separate account established and maintained by the relief association; ~~or~~

(2) at the investment performance rate actually earned on that portion of the assets if the deferred benefit amount is invested in a separate investment vehicle held by the relief association; or

(3) the investment return on the assets of the special fund of the defined contribution volunteer firefighter relief association in proportion to the share of the assets of the special fund to the credit of each individual deferred member account through the accounting date on which the investment return is recognized by and credited to the special fund.

(d) Unless the bylaws of a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance on deferred lump-sum service pensions under paragraph (c) specifies a different interest or additional investment performance method, including the interest or additional investment performance period starting date and ending date, the interest or additional investment performance on a deferred service pension is creditable as follows:

(i) for a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance under paragraph (c), clause (1) or clause (3), beginning on the date that the member separates from active service and membership and ending on the accounting date immediately before the deferred member commences receipt of the deferred service pension; or

(ii) for a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance under paragraph (c), clause (2), beginning on the date that the member separates from active service and membership and ending on the date that the separate investment vehicle is valued immediately before the date on which the deferred member commences receipt of the deferred service pension.

Defined Benefit Plans

424A.02 DEFINED BENEFIT RELIEF ASSOCIATIONS; SERVICE PENSIONS.

Subd. 7. Deferred service pensions...

(c) A defined benefit relief association that provides a lump-sum service pension governed by subdivision 3 may, when its governing bylaws so provide, pay interest on the deferred lump-sum service pension during the period of deferral. If provided for in the bylaws, interest must be paid in one of the following manners:

(1) at the investment performance rate actually earned on that portion of the assets if the deferred benefit amount is invested by the relief association in a separate account established and maintained by the relief association; ~~or~~

(2) at the investment performance rate actually earned on that portion of the assets if the deferred benefit amount is invested in a separate investment vehicle held by the relief association; or

(3) at an interest rate of up to five percent, compounded annually, as set by the board of directors and approved as provided in subdivision 10.

(d) Interest under paragraph (c), clause (2), is payable following the date on which the municipality has approved the deferred service pension interest rate established by the board of trustees.

(e) Unless the bylaws of a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance on deferred lump-sum service pensions under paragraph (c) specifies a different interest or additional investment performance method, including the interest or additional investment performance period starting date and ending date, the interest or additional investment performance on a deferred service pension is creditable as follows:

(i) for a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance under paragraph (c), clause (1) or clause (3), beginning on the first day of the month next following the date on which the member separates from active service and membership and ending on the last day of the month immediately before the month in which the deferred member commences receipt of the deferred service pension; or

(ii) for a relief association that has elected to pay interest or additional investment performance under paragraph (c), clause (2), beginning on the date that the member separates from active service and membership and ending on the date that the separate investment vehicle is valued immediately before the date on which the deferred member commences receipt of the deferred service pension.

Exhibit D Technical Changes

424A.02 DEFINED BENEFIT RELIEF ASSOCIATIONS; SERVICE PENSIONS.

Subd. 9. **Limitation on ancillary benefits.** A defined benefit relief association, including any volunteer firefighters relief association governed by section 69.77 or any volunteer firefighters division of a relief association governed by chapter 424, may only pay ancillary benefits which would constitute an authorized disbursement as specified in section 424A.05 subject to the following requirements or limitations:

(1) with respect to a defined benefit relief association in which governing bylaws provide solely for a lump-sum service pension to a retiring member, or provide a retiring member the choice of either a lump-sum service pension or a monthly service pension and the lump-sum service pension was chosen, no ancillary benefit may be paid to any former member or paid to any person on behalf of any former member after the former member (i) terminates active service with the fire department and active membership in the relief association; and (ii) commences receipt of a service pension as authorized under this section; and

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 356.219, subdivision 8, is amended to read:

Subd. 8. **Timing of reports.** (a) For salaried firefighter relief associations, police relief associations, and volunteer firefighter relief associations, the information required under this section must be submitted by the due date for reports required under section 69.051, subdivision 1 or 1a, as applicable. If a relief association satisfies the definition of a fully invested plan under subdivision 1, paragraph (b), for the calendar year covered by the report required under section 69.051, subdivision 1 or 1a, as applicable, the chief administrative officer of the covered pension plan shall certify that compliance on a form prescribed by the state auditor. The state auditor shall transmit annually to the State Board of Investment a list or lists of covered pension plans which submitted certifications in order to facilitate reporting by the State Board of Investment under paragraph (c).

2.27 (1) at the investment performance rate actually earned on that portion of the assets
2.28 if the deferred benefit amount is invested by the relief association in a separate account
2.29 established and maintained by the relief association or if the deferred benefit amount is
2.30 invested in a separate investment vehicle held by the relief association; or

2.31 (2) at an interest rate of up to five percent, compounded annually, as set by the board
2.32 of directors and approved as provided in subdivision 10.

2.33 (d) Interest under paragraph (c), clause (2), is payable following the date on which
2.34 the municipality has approved the deferred service pension interest rate established by
2.35 the board of trustees.

3.1 (e) For a deferred service pension that is transferred to a separate account established
3.2 and maintained by the relief association or separate investment vehicle held by the relief
3.3 association, the deferred member bears the full investment risk subsequent to transfer and
3.4 in calculating the accrued liability of the volunteer firefighters relief association that pays
3.5 a lump-sum service pension, the accrued liability for deferred service pensions is equal
3.6 to the separate relief association account balance or the fair market value of the separate
3.7 investment vehicle held by the relief association.

3.8 (f) The deferred service pension is governed by and must be calculated under
3.9 the general statute, special law, relief association articles of incorporation, and relief
3.10 association bylaw provisions applicable on the date on which the member separated from
3.11 active service with the fire department and active membership in the relief association."
