WHEREAS, in 2010, the Minnesota Legislature created the Council on Local Results and Innovation; and

WHEREAS the Council on Local Results and Innovation developed a standard set of performance measures that will aid residents, taxpayers, and state and local elected officials in determining the efficacy of counties in providing services and measure residents' opinion of those services; and

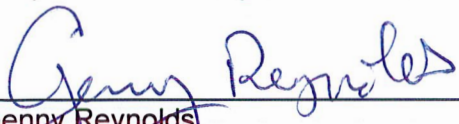
WHEREAS benefits to Mille Lacs County are outlined in Minnesota Statute § 6.91 and include eligibility for a reimbursement as set by State statute; and

WHEREAS, the Mille Lacs County Board of Commissioners has adopted and implemented at least 10 performance measures, as developed by the Council on Local Results and Innovation, and a system to use this information to help plan, budget, manage evaluate programs and processes for optimal future outcomes; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mille Lacs County Board of Commissioners will report the results of the performance measures to its citizenry by the end of the year through publication, direct mailing, posting on the county's website, or through a public hearing at which the budget and levy will be discussed and public input allowed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Mille Lacs County will submit to the Office of the State Auditor the actual results of the performance measures adopted by the county.

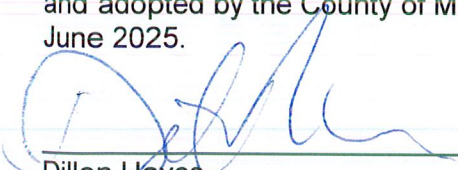
